One of the mottoes of Africa University is "Investing in Africa's Future".



Investing in the AU Farm

Many thanks to all who have helped invest in recent developments at the Farm.

After years of milking by hand, we finally invested in a DeLaval milking machine pipeline system that transports the milk straight from the cow into the bulk cooling tank. The improvement is geared for further expansion of the dairy in the months and years to come.



Our center pivot irrigation system is now in place and irrigating its first crop. We hope that increased yields, reduced costs and the chance to familiarize our staff and students with this technology will prove the wisdom of this BIG investment.

Among new projects on the drawing board in addition to continued development of the dairy

are a new house for raising day-old pullets (female chicks) to become laying hens; a walk-in freezer and better slaughter facilities for assisting in marketing our broilers; and improved housing for our farm workers.
